Making plans for \$3m Piha land block

Waitākere Ranges Local Board members have welcomed council's purchase of 78 hectares of land between Piha and Karekare and look forward to seeing development plans for the area get underway.

The land will link two disconnected parts of the Waitākere Ranges Regional Park, connecting Mercer Bay Loop Track (south of this block) to the Tasman Lookout Track to form a safer alternative route for the section of the Hillary Trail passing through Piha.

Other features of the property – bought for \$3m using council's ring-fenced regional park acquisition funding – include blow holes and sea caves which are identified as some of the best examples on the west coast of Auckland and Northland.

The area also has a number of ecological classifications, recognising the significant landforms, vegetation and wildlife values. It has the remnants of two historic cottages, a headland pa, midden and terraces.

Board chair Sandra Coney says: "The drama of this coastline has been long recognised by artists such as Eric Lee Johnson and Pat Hanly, and now the public will be able to see its rugged beauty for themselves.

"Originally part of the Piha Māori Reserve, it has a strong Māori history with legends of the taniwha Kaiwhare explaining the rock formations. The later European owners have cared for the land for 150 years. It is a great addition to the regional park and to the Hillary Trail."

"This acquisition brings into public ownership a missing link in the West Coast parkland and in the Hillary Trail. This piece of coastline will offer visitors some spectacular views and will open up some great new walks. It is now safe for future generations to enjoy."

Developing tracks, addressing safety issues – particularly around the blow hole – and the provision of life buoys on fishing rocks will be among the first steps considered by officers.

Weed control project




Weed clearance has been taking place across the area.

Replanting will take place during September at sites targeted by the Waitākere Ranges Local Board for a weed control and restoration programme. Council parks staff worked with the board to identify initial high-profile locations in need of weed control. Work has been underway at two sites on Candia Road, Henderson Valley (privet and arundograss), the corner of Bush Road and West Coast Road, Waiatarua (elaeagnus and ginger), and Landing Road Reserve, Laingholm (tradescantia and other weeds).

Replanting will feature a native revegetation mix appropriate for each location and will be followed by two years establishment maintenance to ensure canopy closure is achieved. Protecting and restoring the unique natural environments of the Ranges is a key focus for the board — with weed and pest control, along with education around Kauri dieback disease high on its list of priorities.

Design guide for Foothills



The local board recently signed off on a revised version of the Waitākere Ranges Foothills Design Guide, which will help those seeking to build or develop in the Waitākere Ranges Heritage Area.

The design guide is non-statutory and was first produced under the former Waitākere City Council.

But board members agreed with a finding of the first Heritage Area Monitoring Report last year that said more needed to be done to promote awareness and use of the guide by landowners and council officers.

It funded the updating and reprinting of the document and has agreed it should be referred to in all Land Information Memorandums issued for sites in the Heritage Area.

World War 1 and the west

Regional commemorations are underway to mark the 100-year anniversary of World War 1 – and we want to know what we can be doing to acknowledge this important milestone in the Waitākere Ranges Local Board area.

Three local sites will be part of Auckland Council's First World War Heritage Trail to be launched in late September – the Spragg Monument at Huia, the Waikumete cemetery war graves and the Lion Rock war memorial at Piha.

Restoration and renovation of local monuments and memorial sites has already taken place.

And local libraries will also feature the "Our Boys, Our Families" – a website with guides for research into those who served and were involved in other ways.

Libraries are also running an oral history programme, but the board wants to bring together groups (whether they be RSAs, schools or community organisations) who have an interest in marking the centenary with uniquely local events or activities.

One of the interesting features of the war graves at Waikumete is a headstone marking the resting place of Lance Corporal Peter Solomona, one of the around 500 Rarotongans who came to help the New Zealand war effort. From Manihiki, in the Northern Cooks, Solomona trained at Narrow Neck and then went to the Western Front with the Pioneer Māori Battalion. He was returned very ill in 1917 and died in Auckland Hospital. He is the only soldier from the Rarotongan contingent buried at Waikumete, other Rarotongans who died while training at Narrow Neck Camp are buried on the North Shore.
